The whole of my working career has been in education. I have been at the UO for 14 years, beginning as the librarian for Romance Languages and then adding Classics, English, and Philosophy to my profile. Before that I was on the academic teaching path. I am also a scholar and writer and, always still, a student. I thus naturally tend to see issues in the educational world from the perspectives of the full array of its constituencies.
